President's Message

The objective of the BHA Board is to protect, preserve and enrich our Brentwood community. We are fortunate that we live in an area that enjoys favorable weather and air quality, low crime rates, excellent schools, increasing property values and residents actively engaged in civic life. However, the quality of life issue that takes precedence consistently through the years is *traffic*, particularly congestion on Sunset Boulevard.

We recently signed formal agreements with the Brentwood School and Archer School for Girls related to their future construction plans and subsequent operations. In both cases, volunteers from the BHA board and nearby neighbors worked for years to hammer out a plan that allows the schools growth, while restricting the impacts on Sunset traffic. Those who hoped to see the school plans quashed were unrealistic. The City of Los Angeles promotes and supports the development of schools both public and private. Those who wished to let the plans proceed unfettered perhaps were not fully considering the potential impacts. After meeting with the City, the institutions, the neighbors and pouring over

hundreds of complex documents, the BHA chose what we determined was the most realistic and pragmatic path.

The most important aspect of the agreements is they are long term. They regulate operations and traffic and restrict further expansion *for decades*.

Please remember that while we all feel a little trapped by the congestion, we also live in an amazing neighborhood, more so because we are buffered by other organized and cohesive neighborhoods like Bel Air, Santa Monica and Pacific Palisades.

The VA West Los Angeles

The Veterans Administration is engaged in a process to prepare a Master Plan for the approximately 388 acre West Los Angeles Campus located north and south of Wilshire Blvd on the east side of Federal Ave. It is the largest medical center campus in the VA system.



The VA estimates that there are 11,000 veterans in the LA area in need of targeted homelessness services. tentative plans call for a "housing first" model, that would get veterans off the street into housing with treatment and services, and then into permanent housing. The plans also call for a change in the existing policy that required the West LA campus to be strictly alcohol and drug free.

A Master Plan is a high-level land use planning process that uses community and stakeholder input to define what is important about a place and how its character can be preserved in the future. The West Los Angeles VA Master Plan will describe how the physical elements of the campus can be developed for housing, recreational and healthcare services for veterans in the future. It will identify necessary infrastructure improvements, opportunities to enhance open space and how to protect the historic nature of the campus. This will be the third Master Plan in the past 20 years, but the VA Staff promise that there will be more development and services this time.

The target date for a Final Master Plan Report is October 2015. Thereafter, the process will involve environmental review and implementation.

The BHA is committed to being involved in this process to assure that the future plans are productive and practical and both the VA and the surrounding residential neighborhoods live in harmony for years to come.


A long-time Brentwood homeowner took the initiative and improved an area adjacent to Sunset with an attractive landscape of drought resistance planting.

Please take the time to inspect your property and make sure your area adjacent to the street is at the very least groomed and maintained. In addition, please check to see that your hedges, plantings and trees do not encroach at all on sidewalks, driveways or the street itself. If in doubt, it is best to err on the side of respect for your neighbors and the greater community.



BUNDY AND SUNSET

The BHA has called on our council district office, LAPD and the Department of Transportation to work with us in finding an immediate solution to the dangerous situation at this intersection. Between



July 26 and August 4, there were no less than three collisions, two of which resulted in injuries.

Almost a year ago, the BHA requested DOT reprogram the signals so all four signal lights would be red, in hopes of preventing collisions by drivers heading westbound on Sunset who were frequently running "pure" red lights.

In addition, afternoon gridlock has caused drivers to chance a head-on collision to try and snake around cars blocking the intersection. We will keep you posted on our efforts.

COUNCILMAN BONIN SAYS

The hot topic around Brentwood these days is the Archer School, so let me get straight to the point: I promised repeatedly that I would not support a project that makes traffic worse. I am proud to report that I delivered, and the approved project will actually <u>reduce</u> Archer's impact on Sunset traffic.

That's right. It will reduce traffic – as a result of a set of more than 50 changes to the project, with remarkably strict and groundbreaking conditions, which include: fewer permitted car trips to and from campus than are currently allowed; a whopping 76 percent of students will be required to use vans or buses to commute to and from school; and parent-driven carpools will be required to have at least three students.

These requirements were negotiated largely by the Brentwood Homeowners Association and neighbors of Archer. Archer signed a binding, enforceable covenant with the BHA and neighbors, limiting construction to a tight three-year schedule, and forbidding any further development for 20 years.

I don't think any school has ever agreed to such significant traffic mitigations, and Archer has set a new standard. If every institution on the Sunset corridor abided by these or similar conditions – we would all



experience a noticeable and significant reduction in Sunset traffic. My goal is to make this level of traffic mitigation the norm for Sunset Boulevard so we can all finally get some relief from the corridor's crushing gridlock. Thank you to everyone who made this possible.

CONNECT WITH YOUR NEIGHBORS

When we moved into Brentwood over ten years ago, my wife and I didn't want our young children to grow up in an area where we didn't know our neighbors. So, after meeting a few neighbors, we organized a neighborhood watch meeting. The BHA provided guidance and an LAPD officer spoke to the more than 40 people who attended our first meeting in 2006.

Next, we set up a "Yahoo Group" so that we could connect throughout the year. The Yahoo Group allows you to easily send and receive emails to many people and it's free. Using email addresses that



we gathered at our watch meeting we invited our neighbors to join. Today, we have over 150 people in the group!

It's easy to set up and I encourage you to Group Yahoo for your start a (Google also has a neighborhood. similar product.) Access to our online group is by invitation only and the sole criterion is that the person lives on our street (Bonhill) or on one of the nearby streets. The only non-resident is LAPD Senior Lead Officer Maria Gray who sends us regular crime reports. The online group has enabled us to easily organize block parties and neighborhood watch meetings. Importantly, neighbors can share information and ask questions

about suspicious behavior or police activity and also get recommendations for a plumber or handyman.

To make sure that everyone understands the boundaries of our online group, each person receives the guidelines when he/she registers. We do not allow anonymity or derogatory comments about individuals. The group exists for productive discourse, and allows neighbors to connect and feel part of their block, neighborhood and City.



RIGHT ON

No intersection draws more intense passion than Barrington Ave and Sunset Blvd. It has been labeled a "choke-point" by the council office and is always the subject of traffic discussions. The Department of Transportation has studied requests that a "No Right On Red" be installed for northbound Barrington vehicles. They have determined this would cause further gridlock at San

Vicente and Barrington and further divert traffic to Barrington Place, and is not a solution to the problems at Sunset.

BUNDY-MAYFIELD and other STOP SIGNS




Just when we thought there was a solution at hand, a wrench got thrown in the works. Or in this case, a bus. After herculean efforts by the council office and the Department of Transportation to satisfy most concerns and install a roundabout, a design flaw was discovered, which would prevent the Big Blue Bus from being able to pass through the intersection. This flurry revolving around a stop sign is why the BHA has attended regular meetings with CD11 and DOT and has requested information on all pending installations. We are not looking to dictate policy to the experts, but rather avoid costly and questionable installations, which can waste taxpayer money better suited for

more important issues. The installation and subsequent removal of the San Vicente signage is proof we can lend vital input based on decades of community experience to City agencies trying to act in our best interest and keep up with infrastructure standards.

It takes only one resident request for a stop sign installation to get the wheels rolling at DOT. Studies are performed to determine if the basic criteria is met. Those criteria include traffic patterns, average traffic speeds and frequency and records of collisions.

Email and letters we receive from homeowners are divided. While many believe stops signs are warranted as much as possible, others feel they create an interruption to traffic flow and are not always necessary. The BHA takes a measured approach and feels installations are warranted if they meet the DOT criteria and/or a significant and repetitive problem has occurred at a particular intersection.
